#### > Are they safe?

#### > How much will they cost?

#### > I heard I may need two shots. Is that true?

So far, most vaccines require a booster shot about a month after the first dose to be effective.\*\* Your doctor can help you understand which vaccine you'll get and when and if you'll need a second dose.
